Take a visit to the beautifully updated Wetlands!

The National Aviary's coastal-themed habitat welcomed new birds and unveiled gorgeous features last year. The National Aviary capped off a milestone 70th anniversary year in 2022 with the renovation of the Aviary's second-oldest, and largest, habitat: the Wetlands. The renovation of the 1969 structure combined industry leading sustainability upgrades, naturalistic features that benefit birds and encourage their natural behaviors, and immersive elements that create a fantastic experience for guests.

The beautifully updated Wetlands has a beachy, coastal feel. The room is bright and expansive, and light filters through the lush foliage that reaches up to the ceiling. New residents of the Wetlands, a Black-necked Stilt pair, dart along the pebbly beach at the edge of the pond. The resurfaced walkway that spans the habitat is a sandy color and leads to a 20-foot tall custom sculptural tree, the branches of which provide perching for new species like Straw-necked lbises. The sprawling roots offer seating for guests during daily activities, like the Wetlands Feeding. More than 100 birds call the habitat home, including the Blue-billed Curassow, American Flamingos, the Hadada lbises, the Blue-bellied Roller, Inca Terns, Boat-billed Herons, Plush Crested Jays, Roseate Spoonbills, and several more.

The habitat features more than 20,000-square-feet of new, bird-friendly glass by Vitro Architectural Glass, the exclusive glass partner of the National Aviary, with Walker Glass glazing. Two glass styles—one fully etched for a frosted look and the other etched with a grassy pattern are designed specially to help prevent birds from striking windows. The glass also maximizes UV light to warm the habitat, increase energy efficiency, and provide beneficial light for plants and birds all year. The renovation of the Wetlands was generously sponsored by presenting sponsor Peoples, along with Vitro Architectural Glass. The \$3 million project received additional support from the Allegheny Regional Asset District (RAD), Buhl Foundation, Edith L. Trees Charitable Trust, Caroline Fredricka Holdship Charitable Trust through the PNC Charitable Trusts Grant Review Committee, W.I. Patterson Charitable Trust, and Walker Glass Company Ltd. This Project was financed in part by a grant from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Commonwealth Financing Authority.

Fun play spaces give kids and families the chance to test out their own super powers, and daily talks and feedings give guests a first-hand look at the incredible diversity of birds.

Two daily shows offer and even closer look at the remarkable abilities of birds!

Habitat Heroes is a free-flight theater show featuring macaws, an armadillo, a majestic Bald Eagle and more. The audience discovers the many ways they can be heroes for our planet, as birds fly through the theater above them. SkyDeck, our rooftop theater, highlights impressive birds of prey, like vultures, a falcon, and kites that soar over the audience and circle above the park before swooping in for a treat! The Aviary is renowned for experiences like these that offer guests a chance to see the natural behaviors of birds up close, as Aviary experts share fascinating facts, personal stories, and important conservation information.

Conservation and avian care are always at the core of our programming. This year, we're proud to share the news that a paper featuring the Ivory-billed Woodpecker was published in a peer-reviewed journal, changing the narrative around an iconic species, thought by many, to be extinct. A juvenile African Penguin, affectionately named Pierogi, thrives in our Penguin Point habitat, bringing hope to an endangered species. And, two juvenile Andean Condors, critically endangered throughout their range in Ecuador, impress guests with their 10-foot wingspan! These are only a few examples of the outstanding impact the National Aviary has for birds and their habitats.

As we wrap up another successful Night in the Tropics event, and prepare for our next fundraiser, Hike-A-Thon, we are continuously amazed by the support we receive from the generous community.

We invite you to see the fruits of this support in real time and plan a visit to the Aviary before the end of the summer!

Food Waste - It's for the Birds!

When we toss out leftovers, let veggies sit a little too long in the refrigerator, or end up with more on our plates than we can eat and throw it away,

we are contributing to a big problem. Food waste toads to greenhouse gases that accelerate climate change, pollute waterways, and throw ecosystems out of balance. All of this has a detrimental effect on birds and the environment.

The National Aviary, through a generous grant from the Posner Foundation, is partnering with CleanRobotics, a company that creates and implements innovative solutions to environmental problems. Using CleanRobotics' TrashBot, food waste at the National Aviary will be sorted using artificial intelligence, robotics, computer vision, and machine learning. After grabbing a bite to eat at Atria's, you can toss your trash in the TrashBot and watch as it automatically separates each item, from leftover food to napkins, with 95% accuracy. This diverts recyclable materials from landfills and reduces waste!

You don't have to have a TrashBot at home to begin reducing your food waste. Small steps can make a big difference for the environment—and your wallet.

- Sonly buy what you need. Plan meals that use common ingredients, keep quantity in mind when you're shopping, and maintain an inventory of what you already have to prevent overbuying.
- Love your leftovers! Label your leftovers, use staple go-to recipes, and repurpose leftovers.
- Store smart. Learn how to store fruits and veggies and freeze your food when it's at its prime.
- Dispose of items properly. Learn about your municipality's recycling guidelines and keep your trash properly contained.

Collaborating Across Continents to Save Andean Condors

With immense wingspans that can reach up to 10 feet, there are few birds more awe-inspiring than an Andean Condor. But, as their numbers in the wild decrease, these powerful birds need help. The problems facing Andean Condors are multifaceted, from poisoning to habitat loss. Overcoming these challenges requires working collaboratively to conserve vital habitats in the wild encourage successful breeding in condors in human care to support the long-term health of the species, and increase awareness of the critical role condors play in the environment.

Condors nest in caves or on ledges high up on cliffs in the Andes Mountains, which are virtually inaccessible to researchers. Therefore, little is known about the early months of chickhood, before young condors venture outside of the nest. Hatchings in human care provide an incredible opportunity to observe condor chicks and their parents and learn about their behaviors. That's why when Marijo, the Andean Condor chick, hatched at the National Aviary last summer, the Aviary's team closely documented her development and the behaviors of her mother, Lianni; information extremely valuable for those working to save Andean Condors in the wild and through breeding programs in human care.


In the fall of 2022, the National Aviary's Senior Director of Animal Care and Conservation Programs, Kurt Hundgen, traveled to Ecuador to share the work of his team at the *IV Congreso Internacional de Cóndor Andino* (the 4th International Congress on the Andean Condor), held in Quito. The conference was attended by biologists, ecologists, zoologists, and other researchers, primarily from South America. It was an incredible opportunity to exchange ideas, discuss challenges, and work together on solutions. Kurt's presentation on Marijo's early days caught the attention of his colleagues. There's still much to be learned about Andean Condor breeding, and this rare glimpse into the nest cave can provide insight into the care needed for chicks and parents to thrive.

Sylvia Ronquillo, a Senior Aviculturist at the National Aviary, also made a trip to Ecuador to visit our partner zoo, Bioparque Amaru. As one of Marijo's primary caregivers, Sylvia had firsthand experience in caring for chicks in the delicate early days of chickhood, and supporting parents as they tended to their young. Bioparque Amaru is looking ahead to next year's breeding season, and Sylvia's insight will help the staff in the Cuenca-based zoo create the best conditions for a successful hatching.

The National Aviary's work with Andean Condors has primarily taken place in Ecuador, where the species is considered Critically Endangered (they are Vulnerable throughout the entirety of their range.) Our strong partnerships throughout Ecuador have led to great collaborations: not only do National Aviary staff visit Bioparque Amaru to support their work, but Amaru's staff have also visited the Aviary. The exchange has helped both of our facilities enhance the quality of care for our condors.

In Memory of Lurch the Andean Condor

It is with deep sadness that we share that Lurch the Andean Condor, passed away last fall due to age-related conditions at 52. Lurch had lived at the National Aviary for almost 10 years. He is remembered as a majestic bird with a playful personality who was deeply loved by the National Aviary's staff, volunteers, visitors, and the public. From his perch in the outdoor Condor Court habitat, Lurch captured the attention of countless guests who stopped to admire him and read about the conservation of Andean Condors. We miss Lurch dearly but are heartened to know that his legacy lives on through his daughter, Marijo, who we recently celebrated her one-year hatch day.



Hello, Pierogi!

Pierogi is the juvenile African Penguin who hatched at the National Aviary last fall and quickly stole hearts! Pierogi

hatched in an artificial nest burrow in Penguin Point, a specialized nesting space also used in South Africa to help the hatchings of wild penguins. Pierogi was affectionately named by Aviary staff for his cute-as-a-dumpling appearance. Staff even measured his weight regularly in cheddar and cheese pierogis (a Pittsburgh favorite). Young penguins grow fast—Pierogi weighed just two pierogis at hatching; at age three months he was up to 80 pierogis!

When Pierogi was only a few weeks old, his caregivers discovered he had an abrasion on his left eyelid, which could have occurred while he pushed his way out of the eggshell or while he was very young in the nest. They quickly sprang into action to assess Pierogi's condition and determine the best treatments to ensure the little penguin could thrive. A human eye specialist was brought in to perform a full exam and the results were encouraging: while his condition prevented his left eye from fully closing; he has perfect vision in his right eye.

With a little extra care, Pierogi is thriving in Penguin Point with the rest of the colony. His eye is checked regularly to ensure it remains clean and healthy. And his condition hasn't slowed him down: he is a speedy swimmer, loves basking in the warm sun on the rocks in Penguin Point, and continues to be as cute as a dumpling.
