National Aviary Welcomes a Double Dose of Hope in the Form of TWO Additional African Penguin Chicks!

These pivotal hatchings mark another incredible step towards saving the newly up-listed Critically Endangered species from the brink of extinction.

Readers of the **last BirdCalls edition** might remember an exciting update on the African Penguin juveniles who hatched in 2023, named Dave and Rita Mae by Aviary friends. This February, nearly two years after their Penguin Point arrival, the Aviary welcomed the hatchings of TWO additional African Penguin chicks from beloved, adult penguin pair Bette and Sidney (named after Pittsburgh Penguins' captain, Sidney Crosby). We've recently determined the genders of this quickly-growing sibling set.

The first chick who hatched February 7 is... a **BOY**, and the second, which hatched February 10, is... a **GIRL!**

The adorable duo, who originally weighed about 115 grams **combined**, have more than quadrupled in size while growing in a behind-the-scenes habit under the tender care of their parents and are now sporting sleek grayish-black juvenile feathers. In April, Aviary visitors received a special treat during exclusive, *Chick Talks*, offered daily with admission, which were designed to allow the then-penguin chicks to slowly acclimate to being in social settings, a process incredibly important to their development.

Not only are the new African Penguins a small spark of hope for their species, which is rapidly declining in the wild, but they also represent a significant turning point for mom, Bette. Back in 2018, Bette's care team noticed she wasn't feeling well, and Aviary veterinary staff, led by Senior Director of Zoological Advancement and Avian Medicine, Dr. Pilar Fish, DVM, immediately jumped into action. Through the use of innovative avian medicine methods (like a customized anesthesia method for penguins and repurposing human mustache clippers to safely and closely clip the dense feathers of African Penguins), the veterinary team successfully removed a golf ball-sized mass from Bette's abdomen during a four-hour procedure. With physical therapy and close monitoring from our experts, Bette made a full recovery and continues to thrive as a wonderful mom... a sign of this being that these two chicks are the first she has hatched since that surgery!

Letter From the Director



As we reach the halfway point of 2025, we're reflecting on what's already been an exciting and meaningful year at the National Aviary, and we're just getting started.

This spring, we launched a new seasonal theme, Rainforest Retreat, followed by this summer's *Global*

Odyssey: Avian Adventure. Both have delighted visitors of all ages with immersive experiences and engaging storytelling. We also debuted our most dynamic bird show yet: *Passport to Parks,* presented by AAA Travel. With its travel-inspired theme and close encounters with amazing birds, it's been playing to full houses all season.

To keep the momentum going, we've added fresh **Daily Activities** featuring our newest Animal Ambassadors. Highlights include **Destination Australia: Expert Talk** with a Blue-tongued Skink rarely seen at other zoos, and the return of our one-of-akind **Flamingo Feeding Encounter**. Additional programs, classes, and expert-led birding experiences are also drawing strong interest from families and nature lovers alike.

It's not just our programs that are growing—our bird family is too! This season brought:

- Two African Penguin chicks, a male and a female, an especially exciting milestone given the species' recent designation as Critically Endangered.
- Three Spotted Whistling-Ducklings in our Tropical Rainforest habitat.
- **Two Demoiselle Crane chicks,** hatched and adopted by our resident pair, Niles and Daphne.

We also welcomed a new male Andean Condor, Chavín (Chuh-veen), who may become a mate for Lianni. And in Ecuador, we supported the rehabilitation of a wild Condor named Valentino. Once recovered, he was fitted with a transmitter funded by the National Aviary and released back into the wild.

Meanwhile, our *National Aviary Peregrine FalconCam* captured another incredible season. Three chicks from Carla and Ecco were banded by the Pennsylvania Game Commission and have already fledged the nest, delighting livestream viewers across the region.

On the conservation front, we reached a historic milestone. On Palmyra Atoll, Guam Kingfishers—three of which came from the National Aviary—laid eggs in the wild for the first time in nearly 40 years. This marks major progress for a species once classified as **Extinct in the Wild**.

As we look toward the future, we also reflect on the loving memory of late, deeply beloved volunteer Sarah Blake Anderson-Brownlee. In April, we announced a *Kindness in Action Volunteer Award* in her honor. This award will serve as a daily reminder to continue Sarah's legacy of inspiring a love and passion for birds and the natural world in others.

Your visit this summer will continue to support these important endeavors, as well as many others, during another momentous year at the National Aviary. Thank you.







Updates from the Field: Guam Kingfishers Lay Eggs in the Wild for the first time in 40 years!

In the fall of 2024, the National Aviary made headlines for our global efforts towards saving the Extinct in the Wild Guam Kingfisher (known locally as sihek). From the hatching of three of these birds in our breeding center to their eventual introduction into the wild in August 2024, we are thrilled to share TWO more exciting sihek updates!

Earlier this year, the Aviary's Sihek Recovery Program partners, who are on the ground in Palmyra Atoll monitoring the nine sihek that were released in August of last year, shared reports of laid eggs, marking the first time the species has bred in the wild since their extinction from their native island of Guam in the 1980s.

This historic achievement illustrates just how well the nine sihek, including the three that hatched at the Aviary, continue to flourish in the wild. After their remarkable release last autumn, the four female and five male birds quickly explored their new home, learning how to forage and hunt new prey within the tropical forest. Four pairs have since established territories, built nests, and now, laid eggs, to the delight of the dedicated staff who were instrumental in their reintroduction, including the National Aviary's Senior Aviculturist Brianna Crane. "Getting to see birds that I helped to hatch and raise continue to thrive in the wild is so extraordinary," says Brianna. "Someday soon, these mighty little birds may end up growing the first truly wild population of sihek in 40 years."

Plans are already underway for there to eventually be additional sihek released at Palmyra Atoll in the coming years. And when that happens, Brianna will temporarily embark on an adventure to play an even larger role in making that goal come true, as the Program Coordinator at the Sedgwick County Zoo. "It's truly an honor to take on a greater role with the Sihek Recovery Program," says Brianna. "Being able to return to Sedgwick but now as Program Coordinator after simply delivering the chicks and leaving them in capable hands for the next phase of their journey in past years, is more exciting than I could ever imagine!

National Aviary Welcomes New Male Andean Condor Chavín

The National Aviary is delighted to welcome a new male Andean Condor, Chavín (chuh-veen), to the flock, as part of an AZA-led Species Survival Plan[®] (SSP).

Hailing from the AZA-accredited Brandywine Zoo in Delaware, the fellow 80's baby (hatched 1986) arrived at the Aviary as a potential new mate to our resident adult female (and Marijo's mom!), Lianni (hatched 1984).

Andean Condors are listed as **Vulnerable** throughout their range in South America, and **Critically Endangered** in Ecuador, and are increasingly declining in the wild. The National Aviary plays an important role in their conservation through the participation of the SSP for Andean Condors, which works to protect them and **Endangered** species alike and ensure their self-sustaining survival through accredited breeding programs, wild habitat preservation, and community education.



Chavin's arrival provides an important opportunity for him and Lianni to potentially breed, which would bolster conservation efforts for their species. Their bonding process is still in the developmental phase as they remain on opposite sides of their habitat in Condor Court. Stay tuned for exciting updates on the pair's budding relationship!

National Aviary Supports Release of Rehabilitated Ecuadorian Andean Condor, Valentino

A male Andean Condor, affectionately named Valentino, was found severely injured this past February 14, by researchers from our Ecuadorian sister zoo, Bioparque Amaru.

The majestic bird had unfortunately been shot many times and could not fly. While his situation was dire, the health planning of his quickly assembled care team was strong. After more than two months of rehabilitation and countless treatments—many of which were learned through collaborative efforts with the National Aviary's innovative veterinary and animal conservation teams led by Senior Director of Zoological Advancement & Avian Medicine, Dr. Pilar Fish, DVM, and Senior Director of Animal Care & Conservation Programs, Kurt Hundgen—Valentino flew in the wild once more on April 22 just in time for Earth Day.

Valentino was successfully released in **Cajas National Park**, in an area carefully selected to promote his survival and adaptation. With this release, Valentino is the 23rd Andean Condor to be tagged, with a satellite tracker provided by the National Aviary, in Ecuador, which will share previously uncollected data from a southern section of Ecuador directly with researchers. He is also one of only nine previously injured condors to have been returned to their natural habitat in the last 46 years!

Another Successful Peregrine FalconCam Season!

2025 National Aviary Peregrine FalconCam viewers enjoyed one of the most exciting seasons to date! Peregrine pair Carla and Ecco successfully hatched chicks in the University of Pittsburgh's Cathedral of Learning nest box for the second year in a row.

The mates laid a clutch of eggs in April, with the first two chicks hatching on April 24—just in time for National Take Your Kid to Work Day, followed by the third on April 27. The three hatchlings carefully grew under the watchful eyes of Mom and Dad and livestream viewers and could often be seen napping on camera, which is vital for their development. As part of an ongoing statewide effort to monitor the Peregrine Falcon population—once on the **Endangered Species List**—Pennsylvania Game Commission (PGC) biologist, Patricia Barber, with assistance from Aviary friend and supporter Kate St. John, completed health exams before banding the chicks in late May. The health exams included noting their weight and measurement of leg thickness, which led the PGC biologist to suspect that the two larger juveniles are likely female and the smallest is likely male. In birds of prey, females are generally larger than the males, therefore, weight and leg thickness are solid factors in determining sexes.

National Aviary Educator and Photographer Mike Faix and members of the Marketing team were able to climb to the top of the Cathedral and witness this exciting development! A few weeks later, the chicks officially fledged the nest but continue to hang around the nest site as they grow comfortable flying and hunting on their own. Later this year, after they have acquired the flying and hunting skills necessary for independent survival, they will take off onto their next chapter.

The National Aviary remains grateful to the University of Pittsburgh and Aviary supporter Kate St. John for their continued support of this season's live *FalconCam*.

We look forward to the 2026 *Peregrine FalconCam* season and are hopeful Carla and Ecco will return for a third thrilling chapter!

HABITAT RANGE: Indo-Malayan

FUN FACT: Demoiselle Cranes have a very arduous migration that takes them over the Himalaya Mountains at elevations of over 20,000 feet en route to their Indian wintering grounds.

The fertile eggs were provided to us by the International Crane Foundation for our adult pair, Niles and Daphne, to hatch and "adopt."
